The fourth annual Kick 'n Gliders Adirondack Canoe Trip will be held July 29 through August 2, 1993. This year, we will canoe the St. Regis Canoe Area and the Saranac Lakes. This is a non-strenuous canoe/camping trip suitable for anyone who likes camping and has a little experience paddling a canoe. You will need to carry your gear and your end of a canoe on a few short portages.

The Lakes Region of the Adirondacks is an ideal place for this type of trip, both because of the scenery and because the canoeing is great. We will paddle at a leisurely pace, stopping to swim when we feel like it. We will stay in tents at campsites on the shores of the lakes.

Craftsbury Common, VT Our classic New Year's trip moves to Vermont's famous x-c touring and training center. Only the quality and quantity of food can compete with the availability of varied, groomed trails right outside the door. Instructors are available. (11 Hours drive from Harrisburg)

Big Moose Lake, NY Near our beloved Old Forge in the Adirondacks, this rustic cabin attracts moose, deer, and abundant snow. Leader Dave Leroy can always lead us to a delightful trail. (6-7 hours)

Crystal Lake, PA This nearby touring center receives the lake-effect snow even though it is just a ridge-top or so above Williamsport. Groomed trails. (2-1/2 hours)

Lake Placid, NY Host of two Winter Olympics, this lovely town attracts Kick 'N Gliders year after year. You can bobsled, or dogsled, or ice skate if magnificent mountain skiing is not enough for you. (8-9 hours)

Eagles Mere, PA Just as swallows to Capistrano and eagles to this quaint village, O'Donnell and company nest in the hot tub that makes this trip famous. Space is limited. (2- 2-1/2 hours)

Kooser State Park, PA Not far from home, this western Pa. park consistently has snow and you can find comfort at any level of ski ability. (3 hours)

Black Forest, PA There's always snow in this charming, dense woods where trails are named for legends and vistas take your breath away. Easy-to-get-to middle Pennsylvania. (2- 2-1/2 hours)

Lapland Lake, NY This newcomer to our schedule is ideal for families, and novices. Easy trails, instructors, and a hospitable trip leader are the benefits. Southern Adirondacks. (7 hours)

Somerset, PA Joy found this cozy bed and breakfast in the Pa. Laurel Highlands last year. Join her for some nearby un-discovered delightful skiing. (3 hours)

Canaan Valley, W.VA A new trip this year. This famous West-Virginia snow-bowl is so confident of late snow conditions, it holds its Winter Carnival in March. Stay in cozy cabins with fireplaces with access to this resort town's downhill skiing, ice skating and night life. (4 hours)

Trailside, Vt In Southern Vermont, this ski center allows us to extend the ski season to the very last gasp because it lies in fields of snow. Also a new trip. (8 hours)

Total Cost of trip: \$190 Includes All Meals! Plus \$5/day trail fees.

\$40 Deposit and \$150 due by December 3, 1993. If you must cancel prior to December 3, you forfeit \$20 booking charge. If you cancel after December 3, you forfeit the full deposit.

Rooms are in a dormitory with two persons per room in single beds. Bathrooms with showers are down the hall.

This trip is suited for all levels of skiers, including beginners. Lessons are available for all levels. A very extensive trail system is groomed, and most trails are wide enough for skating. You can ski over farmlands to the adjacent villages, and you can connect to back country trails.

The distance is about 550 miles, or about 11 hours driving.

Our annual pilgrimage to the High Peaks region of the Adirondacks this season will be held on January 26-30, 1994 and this year it coincides with the Full Moon! Total cost of the trip: \$55. Breakfast and dinner are included, and we will share in their preparation. Lunch is on your own.

We will be staying in cabins on the grounds of the Canaan Valley downhill skiing center. There are miles of cross-country trails to choose from within the center and the resort is surrounded by National Forest and close to State Park Areas. Instructors are available. 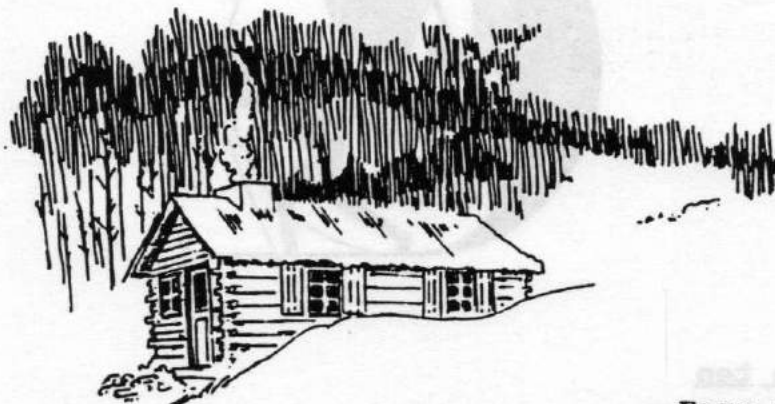
\$40 Deposit now and \$55 due by September 1, 1993. Final \$120 due by January 21, 1994. If you must cancel prior to January 21, you forfeit \$10 booking charge. If you cancel after January 21, you forfeit the full deposit of \$95.

Rooms are in 3 and 4 bedroom cabins, each fully equipped with bathroom and kitchen. The four bedroom "farm house" has a large kitchen and dining area so we can all eat and socialize together in the evenings. Bedrooms are heated with individual thermostats, and there is a woodburning stove in each living room. Blankets and pillows are provided. You must bring sheets and towels.

This trip is suited for all levels of skiers, including beginners. Lessons are available for all levels. A very extensive trail system is groomed and tracked, and trails are wide enough for skating.

The distance is about 350 miles, or about 7 hours driving. The location is just northwest of Albany, NY.

Lapland Lake is a self-contained ski touring center. There is a restaurant available for lunch. There may be special events (such as lighted night skiing). And, there are authentic woodburning Finnish saunas included.

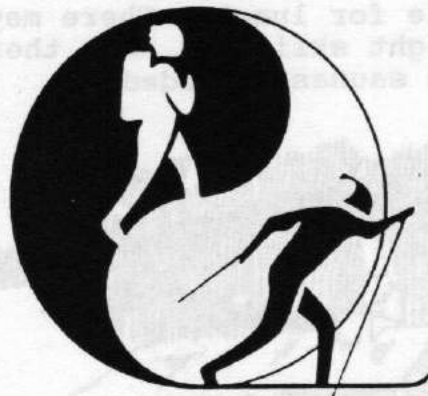

"SKIING THE BLIZZARD OF 93 AT BIG MOOSE LAKE" - March 12-15, 1993  
Group report from Phyllis, Nancy, Dave, Cheryl, Bill and Kay

The December Easy Glider announced that deer, bear, eagles, otters, and the silence of the wilderness at rustic cabins on Big Moose Lake were the reasons that Trip Leader Dave LeRoy decided to try new accommodations for our annual ski trip to the Old Forge area. At the time we signed up, little did we realize how important it would be to be able to "ski out the front door". Our cabin had a complete kitchen, living room and dining area with a beautiful stone fireplace, two bathrooms, three bedrooms, a den, and two porches, with a beautiful view across the lake. We couldn't have enjoyed the "Blizzard of 93" more -- unless those of you who weren't able to join us had been there to share the "storm of the century" experience. We especially missed your help breaking trail in the new (24+" ) snow. Although we've been waiting 5 years for snow, we weren't expecting it all in one day.

## MORE ABOUT BIG MOOSE LAKE

Balsam firs, spruce and cedar trees surround the Adirondack style cabins at Covewood. The retreat center, consisting of 18 housekeeping cabins and a rustic lodge, is located in a 1300 acre state wildlife sanctuary, near Eagle Bay, New York. Major and Mrs. Bowes, experienced naturalists and innkeepers, were our friendly hosts. They encouraged us to help feed the deer by providing sacks of corn for our use (donations gladly accepted). Wildlife was abundant. The deer were so tame they actually ate corn right out of our hands, and regularly watched us through the large picture windows. We lured them within our viewing range by keeping a plentiful supply of corn sprinkled on the ground. I've never seen such big Blue Jays. The flock of mallards also had a healthy appetite, and although we never saw the eagles, moose, otter, bear, mink, or ermine, we had fun looking for them. Actually, Cheryl did find a large moose on the front porch of the lodge when she went looking for the pay phone, but he wasn't very active.

We ate sumptuous meals with lots of fresh fruit and vegetables. Saturday morning there was a knock on the door. "Here is a candle, in case the power goes out. We have our own generator, but we shut it off at 10:00 p.m., so don't be surprised if the lights go out then. Let us know if you need anything!" We were also warned not to block the snowplow that was parked in the garage next to our cabin. We went out skiing, and came back for lunch. It was just starting to snow. Since Dave had broken a pole (the snow was 3' deep before the storm), and for a variety of other reasons (we needed hershey bars to make s'mores for dessert), I decided to roadtest my car in the snow and drove into town with Cheryl and Kay. We got Dave's pole repaired (for free) in Inlet, came back to enjoy cocktail hour, and had Kay's famous lasagna for dinner. Later we built wooden towers with "Ta-ka-radi Tiles". The object of the game is for each player to remove a piece until the tower collapses. The number of players was evenly divided - 3 engineers and 3 peasants. A lot of engineer jokes were told around the fire that evening. We even let them win a few times. Kay brought along her body massager to help relax tired muscles after skiing.

On Sunday morning the snowdrifts around the bedroom windows were so high that we couldn't tell it was a bright sunny day without going outside. Bill ventured out first, and said you couldn't even get to the cars without gaitors on. The roads were quickly plowed and our hosts even dug out our cars. Skiing was much harder work because of the new snow. We skied the now familiar 1 mile access trail, hoping to try a new route to Mays Pond or Queer Lake, but found a 5' drift across the entrance. We had a good laugh at the thought of breaking that trail, took a group photo, and decided to try skiing on the road instead. We passed other skiers that Dave tried to talk into breaking trail in the areas we wanted to go, but still didn't get much help. We had lunch, started calling home for

road reports, and hung out around the fireplace some more. Later we skied on snowmobile tracks, and came back for another fantastic dinner, followed by the "ultimate decadence". We made s'mores in the oven because we forgot to get sticks to roast the marshmallows in the fireplace. Due to the snow reports we were getting from Harrisburg, we started calling the state police to see if we were going to be able to drive home on Monday. Some of us skied over to the pay phone several times. Other than the endless lists of cancellations playing on the radio, it was our only source of news from the outside world, and we didn't want family and friends worrying about us. We would return with reports from Florida, Arizona, and various Pennsylvania locations.

We arrived Friday afternoon, after listening to the radio announcements from the Emergency Broadcast System predicting extended power and telephone outages. We had just about everything we needed with us, including enough food to stay a week, so we were happy to be settled in before it started snowing. We eagerly put on our skis and went out to explore the area, not knowing what conditions to expect for the rest of the weekend. Friday evening we skied the same trail, which was an exhilarating experience for those of us who haven't done any serious skiing at night before.

Monday morning we found out that the major roads were open, although it became clear that it was not business as usual in Harrisburg. State government offices were closed. Four of us decided to ski at McCauley Mountain in Old Forge before driving home, because the trails had been "groomed" and it was a beautiful sunny day. It is true that a snowmobile had been driven around part of the trail, but we were the only cross-country skiers there. We left Old Forge at 2:00 p.m. The state police told us we would be unable to travel on Rt. 28 between Utica and Binghamton, because the road kept drifting shut, so we took the Thruway to Rt 81 at Syracuse. Other than that, there was no snow on the roads all the way home until we got to Harrisburg. There were 4' drifts across my driveway which had not been plowed, so I parked my car and skied in to get clothes for work. Everyone else did a considerable amount of shoveling when they got home, which lasted over several days. We had such a wonderful time, that I almost felt guilty comparing snow stories with people who were here in Harrisburg. It couldn't have been better -- except for having more help to break trails. Maybe next time you'll join us!

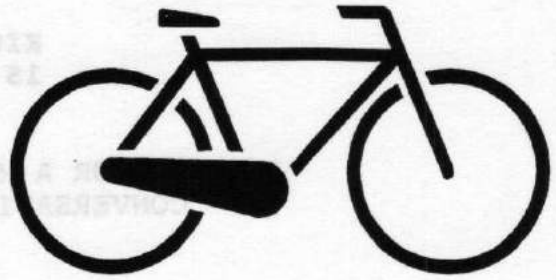

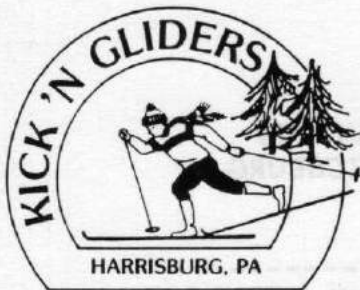
